Stormwater Management & Public Education



The RC&D Council and its partners have constructed 50 acres of stormwater wetlands on commercial and public properties. The wetlands help protect water quality and serve as outdoor education classrooms.

Nature Tourism

The Albemarle RC&D Council has worked with local governments and recreational groups to develop a regional paddle trails system including 22 camping platforms in three counties.



Public Water Access

Perquimans County, with grant writing and technical assistance from Albemarle RC&D Council, constructed a 200 ft handicap accessible fishing pier and canoe/kayak access at the Perquimans Community Center.



Shoreline Stabilization

Storm surge and heavy rain from hurricanes removed about 30 feet of shoreline bluff in front of the multi-million dollar community center in Perquimans County. The county, with grant writing and technical assistance from Albemarle RC&D Council and

Perquimans Soil and Water stabilized 400 ft of shoreline bluff in front of the community center building, and installed 1,000 ft of rock sill in shallow water along the shoreline to protect this important public facility.
